I've never regretted the times I voted for Jean Fassler for supervisor. She is an asset to Pacifica and San Mateo county, as well as being an admirable person.

Mrs. Fassler's endorsement of Fred Lyon for Supervisor is just one more reason to vote for him. Fred is young, vigorous. I judge him to be an honest man, a quality of vast in portance in a politician.

We can get the same power from solar and wind sources. Take electricity from the sun, power from the wind. Use it. That's the end of the matter.

Nuclear power, on the other hand, extracts a Faustian exchange. The "contract" might well have been extracted by the devil himself.

After the example of the OPEC petroleum blackmail, we should never allow control of power to be centralized. Nuclear power is centralized power.

Nuclear power plants will kill. Something can happen, therefore, inevitably, something will happen, given time. Accidents . . . conspiracy . . . sloppiness . . . carelessness . . . either in guar ing the plants or their waste products.

It is a matter only of time.

The waste products of atomic power, so powerful that three specks the size of a period (...) can kill, must be carefully guarded actively "managed" for the next 10,000 generations, by trained, civilized, knowledgable profectors

I don't believe the power companies when they tell me that nuclear power plants are safe. Why not? They won't accept the responsibility, and their insurance companies won't take the risk!

I bow to their superior judgment. If they won't take the risk with their money, why should I blindly accept the risk to the lives of myself and my family, not to mention yours.

The modest requirements of Prop. 15, namely, that the plants be proven safe, are if anything, too little and too late. I'm voting yes! It's safer!
