## DRAFT ENVIRONMENTAL IMPACT REPORT From A.N.

To Praiput Nbqrzeu, Great chief of all Costanoans and Mussel shell gatherer, third class.

THE PROBLEM: A group of the people called Spaniards, and their allies from the land of Montezuma's revenge have arrived and are receiving our hospitality. It

appears they may wish to settle in our lands.

Our wise men have smoked willow leaves, meditated, and gone late trances, and make the following predictions

if the Spanish are allowed to settle.

THEY WILL bring their cattle and horses to remove
the grasses of our hills. The hills will then wash down to
muddy our beautiful clean creeks.

They will kill all the Grizzlies. Where then will we get

bear grease to make our hair neat?

THEY WILL build many fires and turn the pure wind a dirty brown. They will ride many horses, and these will pollute the landscape with their droppings.

After the Spanish others will come, who will bring water in hollow tubes from the great snowy mountains

and through the great valley.

THIS PURE water they will dilute with their filth, and then convey it at great expense to a central place where it will small while they half-way clean it, then dump it in the oce in to foul the clems and mussals.

Thus their wastes, instead of returning to enrich mother earth from which they came, will be stolen from the soil, only to dirty the great sea.

ALL THIS will be done at great expense. They will call us savages, but they will cut the trees, smear the tralls with liquid rock and bitumen, and bring thousands of their people into an area which can properly support

only our 300 people.
