# The Reactor

## Rights—Ours' and Society's

A man named Goetz got famous and jailed, in that order, for having a gun with him in the New York subway. He used it to shoot four teen-agers who allegedly threatened him with sharpened screwdrivers. Goetz is being cheered by a lot of people, criticized by some others

I hope that Goetz is punished, not for the shooting, which was well-justified, but for carrying a gun, which was not. The teen-agers ought to be punished as well, because they too, were carrying deadly weapons, and evidently they planned to use them for wrong purposes.

The person who aggressively tries to threaten or intimidate another person with a deadly weapon, by that action has forfeited his own right to life. Simple as that. The minute the teen-ager's threatened to use their sharpened screwdrivers, which are deadly weapons, their rights went down the drain.

On the other hand, Mr. Goetz had no right to carry a gun on the subway. Carrying a gun in such an environment threatens everyone, even if only by accident. Far more people are hurt by gun accidents in such a situation than are protected by the weapons being there.

Ernest Joiner, who makes his living as the publisher of the Sebastopol Times and his fame as the writer of outrageous opinions, objects to mandatory seatbelt laws as an unwarranted infringement on his rights. "I choose not to wear seatbelts while driving my car", he says. Smoking, drinking to excess, and driving without seatbelts are all part of an attitude that says "society has no right to control what I choose to do to myself." I would agree with that attitude except that when the seatbelt wearer is squashed all over his windshield, or thrown from and crushed by his own car, who pays for the ambulance, the police investigation, the hospital equipment? With taxes or by higher medical insurance, we all do. Have you noticed the cost of medical insurance these days. It's astronomical. And a large part of it is devoted to paying the price of unbelted drivers, overbelted drinkers, and smokers who should have quit years ago, the better to serve as good examples to their children, who smoke far more often that the children of nonsmokers.

Ask not by whom the seatbelt is unused. If it is unused by thee, that lack of use is costly to a whole society. When you don't buckle, you add to my problems, and

vice versa.

Joiner's newspaper reports some familiar problems. Evidently life in Sebastopol has similarities to Pacifica. A crumbling length of old sewer line under Bodega Avenue is "a keg of dynamite" according to the head of Sebastopol public works.
